21 "Not everyone who says to me, 'Lord, Lord,' will enter the kingdom of heaven, but only he who does the will of my Father who is in heaven. 22 Many will say to me on that day, 'Lord, Lord, did we not prophesy in your name, and in your name drive out demons and perform many miracles?' 23 Then I will tell them plainly, 'I never knew you. Away from me, you evildoers!'"

Then you will be able to test and approve what God's will is — his good, pleasing and perfect will.

That power is like the working of his mighty strength, 20 which he exerted in Christ when he raised him from the dead and seated him at his right hand in the heavenly realms, 21 far above all rule and authority, power and dominion, and every title that can be given, not only in the present age but also in the one to come. 22 And God placed all things under his feet and appointed him to be head over everything for the church, 23 which is his body, the fullness of him who fills everything in every way.

With this in mind, be alert and always keep on praying for all the saints.

JESUS PAID FOR OUR SIN IN FULL

Eph 1:7-9 (NIV)

In him we have redemption through his blood, the forgiveness of sins, in accordance with the riches of God's grace 8 that he lavished on us with all wisdom and understanding.

DEFINITION OF REDEMPTION:

REDEMPTION

There are many passages in the New Testament which represent Christ's sufferings under the idea of a ransom or price, and the result thereby secured is a purchase or redemption (comp. Acts 20:28; 1 Cor 6:19,20; Gal 3:13; 4:4,5; Eph 1:7; Col 1:14; 1 Tim 2:5,6; Titus 2:14; Heb 9:12; 1 Peter 1:18,19; Rev 5:9). The idea running through all these texts, however various their reference, is that of payment made for our redemption. The debt against us is not viewed as simply cancelled, but is fully paid. Christ's blood or life, which he surrendered for them, is the "ransom" by which the deliverance of his people from the servitude of sin and from its penal consequences is secured. It is the plain doctrine of Scripture that "Christ saves us neither by the mere exercise of power, nor by his doctrine, nor by his example, nor by the moral influence which he exerted, nor by any subjective influence on his people, whether natural or mystical, but as a satisfaction to divine justice, as an expiation for sin, and as a ransom from the curse and authority of the law, thus reconciling us to God by making it consistent with His perfection to exercise mercy toward sinners" (Hodge's Systematic Theology)

ROAD TO FORGIVENESS AND NEW LIFE:

REPENT OF OUR SINS AND OUR SINFULNESS

Acts 3:17-20 (NIV)

17 "Now, brothers, I know that you acted in ignorance, as did your leaders. 18 But this is how God fulfilled what he had foretold through all the prophets, saying that his Christ would suffer. 19 Repent, then, and turn to God, so that your sins may be wiped out, that times of refreshing may come from the Lord, 20 and that he may send the Christ, who has been appointed for you — even Jesus.

1 John 1:5-10

5 This is the message we have heard from him and declare to you: God is light; in him there is no darkness at all. 6 If we claim to have fellowship with him yet walk in the darkness, we lie and do not live by the truth. 7 But if we walk in the light, as he is in the light, we have fellowship with one another, and the blood of Jesus, his Son, purifies us from all sin. 8 If we claim to be without sin, we deceive ourselves and the truth is not in us. 9 If we confess our sins, he is faithful and just and will forgive us our sins and purify us from all unrighteousness. 10 If we claim we have not sinned, we make him out to be a liar and his word has no place in our lives.

5. PUT YOUR FULL _____ IS GOD'S _____ FOR YOUR _____

Phil 3:4-10 (NIV)

If anyone else thinks he has reasons to put confidence in the flesh, I have more: 5 circumcised on the eighth day, of the people of Israel, of the tribe of Benjamin, a Hebrew of Hebrews; in regard to the law, a Pharisee; 6 as for zeal, persecuting the church; as for legalistic righteousness, faultless. 7 But whatever was to my profit I now consider loss for the sake of Christ. 8 What is more, I consider everything a loss compared to the surpassing greatness of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord, for whose sake I have lost all things. I consider them rubbish, that I may gain Christ 9 and be found in him, not having a righteousness of my own that comes from the law, but that which is through faith in Christ — the righteousness that comes from God and is by faith.

v. KNOW THE FACTS

We must understand, and *believe* the Biblical truths (facts) concerning human sinfulness and God's provision of salvation through Jesus Christ.

Fact #1: God created humankind in His image and He loves every person (Genesis 1:27; John 3:16).


Fact #2: All humans are born with a sinful nature and every person has broken God's commandments by sinning (Romans 3:23). Because of our sinfulness, we have been separated from God (Isaiah 59:2). The only way we can enjoy a personal relationship with Him is by accepting His forgiveness through Jesus Christ (Romans 6:23).

Fact #3: God desires to forgive and restore all those who turn away from their sins and turn to Him (Isaiah 55:6-7; Acts 3:19-20; 2 Peter 3:9).

Fact #4: Jesus Christ is God's only remedy and provision for reconciling us to God (Isaiah 53:6; John 14:6; Acts 4:12; Romans 5:8).

Fact #5: In order to be restored to a right relationship with God we must acknowledge our sin, acknowledge Jesus Christ is Lord, and personally invite Jesus into our hearts to be our Savior and Lord (John 1:10-13; Romans 10:9-10; 2 Corinthians 5:17-19).

KEY SCRIPTURE:

John 3:1-15 (NIV)

Now there was a man of the Pharisees named Nicodemus, a member of the Jewish ruling council. 2 He came to Jesus at night and said, "Rabbi, we know you are a teacher who has come from God. For no one could perform the miraculous signs you are doing if God were not with him." 3 In reply Jesus declared, "I tell you the truth, no one can see the kingdom of God unless he is born again." 4 "How can a man be born when he is old?" Nicodemus asked. "Surely he cannot enter a second time into his mother's womb to be born!" 5 Jesus answered, "I tell you the truth, no one can enter the kingdom of God unless he is born of water and the Spirit. 6 Flesh gives birth to flesh, but the Spirit gives birth to spirit. 7 You should not be surprised at my saying, 'You must be born again.' 8 The wind blows wherever it pleases. You hear its sound, but you cannot tell where it comes from or where it is going. So it is with everyone born of the Spirit." 9 "How can this be?" Nicodemus asked. 10 "You are Israel's teacher," said Jesus, "and do you not understand these things? 11 I tell you the truth, we speak of what we know, and we testify to what we have seen, but still you people do not accept our testimony. 12 I have spoken to you of earthly things and you do not believe; how then will you believe if I speak of heavenly things? 13 No one has ever gone into heaven except the one who came from heaven — the Son of Man. 14 Just as Moses lifted up the snake in the desert, so the Son of Man must be lifted up, 15 that everyone who believes in him may have eternal life.

It does not submit to God's law, nor can it do so. 8 Those controlled by the sinful nature cannot please God.

16 So I say, live by the Spirit, and you will not gratify the desires of the sinful nature. 17 For the sinful nature desires what is contrary to the Spirit, and the Spirit what is contrary to the sinful nature. They are in conflict with each other, so that you do not do what you want. 18 But if you are led by the Spirit, you are not under law. 19 The acts of the sinful nature are obvious: sexual immorality, impurity and debauchery; 20 idolatry and witchcraft; hatred, discord, jealousy, fits of rage, selfish ambition, dissensions, factions 21 and envy; drunkenness, orgies, and the like. I warn you, as I did before, that those who live like this will not inherit the kingdom of God. 22 But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, 23 gentleness and self-control. Against such things there is no law. 24 Those who belong to Christ Jesus have crucified the sinful nature with its passions and desires. 25 Since we live by the Spirit, let us keep in step with the Spirit. 26 Let us not become conceited, provoking and envying each other.

WHO IS JESUS?

The true understanding of the person of Jesus Christ is the cornerstone of all that we, as Christians, believe and hold as true. There are many false religions in our world which teach that Jesus was a good prophet, but not God. The truth is, if Jesus is not God we could not be eternally saved.

CLASS OBJECTIVE: TO SHOW THAT JESUS IS GOD.

What Jesus said about himself:

“I and the father are one”

John 10:27-33 (NIV)

I and the Father are one." Again the Jews picked up stones to stone him, but Jesus said to them, "I have shown you many great miracles from the Father. For which of these do you stone me?" "We are not stoning you for any of these," replied the Jews, "but for blasphemy, because you, a mere man, claim to be God."

Before Abraham was “I Am”

John 8:54-59 (NIV)

Jesus replied, "If I glorify myself, my glory means nothing. My Father, whom you claim as your God, is the one who glorifies me. Though you do not know him, I know him. If I said I did not, I would be a liar like you, but I do know him and keep his word. Your father Abraham rejoiced at the thought of seeing my day; he saw it and was glad." "You are not yet fifty years old," the Jews said to him, "and you have seen Abraham!" "I tell you the truth," Jesus answered, "before Abraham was born, I am!" At this, they picked up stones to stone him, but Jesus hid himself, slipping away from the temple grounds.

YHWH or Yahweh, the “I AM”

The four-consonant Hebrew word “YHWH” is the name by which God called Himself after revealing Himself to Moses in a burning bush (Exo. 3:2a,14) it means “I Am That I Am” or, more simply, “I AM.” This signifies that no one fully can describe or define God other than God Himself. “YHWH” is short for “Yahweh,” because the entire word was (and still is by many) regarded to be too sacred to speak or write. Many Christians use “Yahweh,” since Jesus taught us to speak in a familiar, personal manner to and about God.

While Jesus and His disciples were in an olive grove, Jesus knew that He soon would be betrayed (John 18:1-7). When the soldiers and officials came to arrest Jesus, He asked who it was that they wanted (18:4). When they replied, “Jesus of Nazareth,” Jesus’ response was, “I am he”—or, literally, “*I am*” (18:5). When Jesus stated this declaration to be God, “...they drew back and fell to the ground” (18:6). Why? Because they were in the direct presence of God in flesh and had experienced a momentary release of His overwhelming Power.

Some may argue that this was an isolated instance. But Jesus also used “I AM” for himself on several other occasions. Let’s look at some of these, trying to imagine our reactions upon hearing Jesus’ radical claims:

- “I am the light of the world” (John 8:12)
- “I am the way, the truth and the life” (John 14:6)
- “I am the only way to the Father” (John 14:6)
- “I am the resurrection and the life” (John 11:25)
- “I am the Good Shepherd” (John 10:11)
- “I am the door” (John 10:9)
- “I am the living bread” (John 6:51)
- “I am the true vine” (John 15:1)
- “I am the Alpha and Omega” Rev.1:7, 8)

“I have been given complete authority in heaven and on earth”.

Mark 2:9-12 (NIV)

The following words are adapted from the famous essay, "One Solitary Life":

"Jesus was born in an obscure village, the child of a peasant woman. He worked in a carpenter shop until He was 30, and then, for three years, He was an itinerant preacher. He never owned a home. He never wrote a book. He never held public office. He never had a family. He never went to college. He never traveled 200 miles from the place where He was born. He never did one of the things that usually accompany greatness. He had no credentials but Himself ...

While still a young man, the tide of popular opinion turned against Him. His friends deserted Him. He was turned over to His enemies. He endured a mock trial and was nailed upon a cross between two thieves. While He was dying, His executioners gambled for the only piece of property He had on earth - His coat. When He was dead, He was taken down and laid in a borrowed grave through the pity of a friend.

2,000 long years have come and gone, and today He is the centerpiece of the human race. It can easily be stated that all the armies that ever marched, all the navies that ever sailed, all the governments that ever ruled and all the kings that ever reigned, put together, have not affected the life of man upon this earth as powerfully as has that one solitary life."

More than three hundred prophecies about Christ were fulfilled in the Bible. Two examples can be found in Isaiah 53:1-12 and Psalms 22:1-18.

Isaiah 53:1-12 (NIV)

"Who has believed our message and to whom has the arm of the LORD been revealed? He grew up before him like a tender shoot, and like a root out of dry ground. He had no beauty or majesty to attract us to him, nothing in his appearance that we should desire him. He was despised and rejected by mankind, a man of suffering, and familiar with pain. Like one from whom people hide their faces he was despised, and we held him in low esteem. Surely he took up our pain and bore our suffering, yet we considered him punished by God, stricken by him, and afflicted. But he was pierced for our transgressions, he was crushed for our iniquities; the punishment that brought us peace was on him, and by his wounds we are healed. We all, like sheep, have gone astray, each of us has turned to our own way; and the LORD has laid on him the iniquity of us all. He was oppressed and afflicted, yet he did not open his mouth; he was led like a lamb to the slaughter, and as a sheep before its shearers is silent, so he did not open his mouth. By oppression and judgment he was taken away. Yet who of his generation protested? For he was cut off from the land of the living; for the transgression of my

people he was punished. He was assigned a grave with the wicked, and with the rich in his death, though he had done no violence, nor was any deceit in his mouth. Yet it was the LORD's will to crush him and cause him to suffer, and though the LORD makes his life an offering for sin, he will see his offspring and prolong his days, and the will of the LORD will prosper in his hand. After he has suffered, he will see the light of life^[d] and be satisfied; by his knowledge my righteous servant will justify many, and he will bear their iniquities. Therefore I will give him a portion among the great, and he will divide the spoils with the strong, because he poured out his life unto death, and was numbered with the transgressors. For he bore the sin of many, and made intercession for the transgressors."

Psalms 22:1-18 (NIV)

"My God, my God, why have you forsaken me? Why are you so far from saving me, so far from my cries of anguish?

My God, I cry out by day, but you do not answer, by night, but I find no rest.

Yet you are enthroned as the Holy One; you are the one Israel praises.



I. OBJECTIVE

To discover who the Holy Spirit is and what He does in the life of the believer.

II. INTRODUCTION

Before Jesus ascended to heaven after he resurrected from the grave, He told His disciples to wait (tarry) in the upper room until they were clothed with power from on high (Luke 24:49). Jesus was referring to the power that comes from the Holy Spirit (Acts 1:8). Unfortunately, many Christians never take the time to discover who the Holy Spirit is and how He works in their lives. As a result, these believers live unfulfilled, fruitless, spiritually malnourished lives. They live within the limits of their own human strength instead of tapping into the power of the Holy Spirit.

III. WHO IS THE HOLY SPIRIT?

1. He is a person.

How do we know He is a person? Because He:

- Makes decisions (1 Corinthians 12:11)
- Is referred to as "He" not "it" (John 16:7-8)
- Can be blasphemed (Mark 3:29)
- Can be resisted (Acts 7:51)
- Can be lied to (Acts 5:3)



2. When does the Holy Spirit come to live in your life?

The Holy Spirit lives in you from the moment you receive Jesus Christ as your Lord and Savior (Ephesians 1:13-14 and Romans 8:16). However, sometimes a person can have the Holy Spirit abiding in him or her and still be living an empty and powerless life. Why does this happen? For three reasons:

1. A person is double-minded. You cannot serve both God and yourself. The Holy Spirit is a gentleman and He will not force Himself upon you (Acts 7:51).
2. A person refuses to yield to the control of the Holy Spirit (Ephesians 5:18).
3. A born-again Christian has not experienced the fullness of the Holy Spirit by faith; commonly referred to as the "baptism in the Holy Spirit".

3. What is the baptism in the Holy Spirit?

Jesus said to His disciples in Acts 1:5, "For _____ baptized with _____, but, in a few days you will be _____ with the _____".

In order to understand the baptism in the Holy Spirit, we must first look at the term “baptism”. The definition of “baptism” is to immerse or to bury. Therefore, to be baptized in the Holy Spirit means:

- to be **immersed**
- to be **saturated**, and
- to be **clothed** in the Holy Spirit

It is being enveloped with the

- **Power**
- **Presence**, and
- **Potential** of the Holy Spirit

The baptism in the Holy Spirit is not Spirit indwelling, but Spirit:

- **Immersion**
- **Submersion**, and
- **Empowering**

4. Why is it important to be baptized in the Holy Spirit?

1. It is the clothing of power (Luke 24:49)
2. It is an equipping for service (Acts 1:8)
3. At baptism, we receive the (power) gifts of the Spirit (1 Corinthians 12:7-11):
 - Prophecy
 - Tongues
 - Interpretation
 - Healing
 - Discerning of Spirit
4. It is the anointing of God, which symbolizes our dedication, consecration, and separation. In the Bible, oil is the symbol of God’s anointing. David and Saul were anointed (in the Old Testament) and Jesus was anointed as well (Isaiah 61:1 and Luke 4:18)
5. It is a commission to go into the world to be God’s witnesses (Acts 1:8 and 2:4)
6. It is being submersed in God’s power, bringing a fuller experience of the Fruits of the Spirit. Read Galatians 5:22-23 and list them:

7. It is an empowering and enabling aid in the believer's prayer life:
 - The Holy Spirit helps us to pray and pray through us the divine will of God (Romans 8:26)
 - The Holy Spirit give us direction in prayer (Acts 13:1-3)

5. Who can receive the gift of the baptism in the Holy Spirit?

Anyone and everyone who is born-again and desires to be filled with God's power in order to do His will can be baptized in the Holy Spirit. God tells us that His Spirit is available to anyone who asks, knocks, and seeks (Matthew 7:7-10). God is no respecter of persons and He wants everyone to be equipped with His power and His gifts (Acts 1:8 and 1 Corinthians 12:4-7)

6. How can I be baptized in the Holy Spirit?

1. Confess any known sins to God and tell him your absolute need for the Holy Spirit to cleanse you (J John 1:9)
2. Yield control of every area of your life to God (Romans 6: 12-13).
3. Pray and seek God earnestly (Hebrews 11:6).
4. Ask the Holy Spirit to empower you as He comes upon you (Acts 2:4).
5. Receive prayer from other believers for the baptism in the Holy Spirit (Acts 9: 17)
6. Be open to the supernatural power and manifestations of God's Spirit, i.e. speaking in an unknown language (tongues), prophecy, healing, interpretation, etc.

WHAT IS THE BAPTISM IN THE HOLY SPIRIT?

Read: **Acts 2:1-21 (NIV)**

"When the day of Pentecost came, they were all together in one place. Suddenly a sound like the blowing of a violent wind came from heaven and filled the whole house where they were sitting. They saw what seemed to be tongues of fire that separated and came to rest on each of them. All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other tongues^[a] as the Spirit enabled them. Now there were staying in Jerusalem God-fearing Jews from every nation under heaven. When they heard this sound, a crowd came together in bewilderment, because each one heard their own language being spoken. Utterly amazed, they asked: "Aren't all these who are speaking Galileans? Then how is it that each of us hears them in our native language? Parthians, Medes and Elamites; residents of Mesopotamia, Judea and Cappadocia, Pontus and Asia, Phrygia and Pamphylia, Egypt and the parts of Libya near Cyrene; visitors from Rome (both Jews and converts to Judaism); Cretans and Arabs—we hear them declaring the wonders of God in our own tongues!" Amazed and perplexed, they asked one another, "What does this mean?" Some, however, made fun of them and said, "They have had too much wine." Then Peter stood up with the Eleven, raised his voice and addressed the crowd: "Fellow Jews and all of you who live in Jerusalem, let me explain this to you; listen carefully to what I say. These people are not drunk, as you suppose. It's only nine in the morning! No, this is what was spoken by the prophet Joel: "'In the last days, God says, I will pour out my Spirit on all people. Your sons and daughters will prophesy, your young men will see visions, your old men will dream dreams. Even on my servants, both men and women, I will pour out my Spirit in those days, and they will prophesy. I will show wonders in the heavens above and signs on the earth below, blood and fire and billows of smoke. The sun will be turned to darkness and the moon to blood before the coming of the great and glorious day of the Lord. And everyone who calls on the name of the Lord will be saved.'"

IS THE BAPTISM IN THE HOLY SPIRIT A _____ OF THE HOLY SPIRIT?

The question we must ask ourselves is:

When are we baptized in the Holy Spirit?

2. Is the Baptism in the Holy Spirit a _____ in the believer’s life or does it all happen at one time?

Some people teach that a believer needs not to seek another experience of the Holy Spirit, but to apply the work of the Holy Spirit.

At salvation, the Holy Spirit comes to live (abide) in every believer... we are the temple of the Holy Spirit.

- a. Scripture shows us that born-again believers received the Holy Spirit after they became born-again.

Let’s take a look at:

- b. The experience of the disciples:

1. They had confessed Jesus as Christ, the Son of God.

Matt. 16:16 (NIV)

“Simon Peter answered, “You are the Messiah, the Son of the living God.”

John 6:68 & 69 (NIV)

“Simon Peter answered him, “Lord, to whom shall we go? You have the words of eternal life. We have come to believe and to know that you are the Holy One of God.”

2. Their _____.

Luke 10:20 (NIV)

However, do not rejoice that the spirits submit to you, but rejoice that your names are written in heaven.”

3. Then the Lord breathed on them, and said, “Receive ye the Holy Spirit.”

Forty days later He commanded them to “tarry until” – “they were endowed with power.”

John 20:22 (NIV)

“And with that he breathed on them and said, “Receive the Holy Spirit.”

Luke 24:48 (NIV)

I am going to send you what my Father has promised; but stay in the city until you have been clothed with power from on high.”

The same disciples then received the other work in the Holy Spirit. (The Baptism)

- c. The experience of the Samaritans:

1. They _____ and were _____ under Philip’s ministry.

Acts 8:5-12 (NIV)

“Philip went down to a city in Samaria and proclaimed the Messiah there. When the crowds heard Philip and saw the signs he performed, they all paid close attention to what he said. For with shrieks, impure spirits came out of many, and many who were paralyzed or lame were healed. So there was great joy in that city. Now for some time a man named Simon had practiced sorcery in the city and amazed all the people of Samaria. He boasted that he was someone great, and all the people, both high and low, gave him their attention and exclaimed, “This man is rightly called the Great Power of God.”¹¹ They followed him because he had amazed them for a long time with his sorcery. But when they believed Philip as he proclaimed the good news of the kingdom of God and the name of Jesus Christ, they were baptized, both men and women.”

2. It was later that they received the Holy Spirit’s Baptism.

Acts 8:14-19 (NIV)

When the apostles in Jerusalem heard that Samaria had accepted the word of God, they sent Peter and John to Samaria. When they arrived, they prayed for the new believers there that they might receive the Holy Spirit, because the Holy Spirit had not yet come on any of them; they had simply been baptized in the name of the Lord Jesus. Then Peter and John placed their hands on them, and they received the Holy Spirit. When Simon saw that the Spirit was given at the laying on of the apostles’ hands, he offered them money and said, “Give

me also this ability so that everyone on whom I lay my hands may receive the Holy Spirit.”

3. The people of Samaria were _____ before _____.

Vs. 12 - They believed and were baptized, this is the only qualification for salvation. They were saved!

John 3:16 (NIV)

“For God so loved the world that he gave his one and only Son, that whoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life.”

Romans 6:23 (NIV)

“For the wages of sin is death, but the gift of God is eternal life in Christ Jesus our Lord.”

Eph. 2:8-9 (NIV)

“For it is by grace you have been saved, through faith—and this is not from yourselves, it is the gift of God—not by works, so that no one can boast.”

- d. The experience of Paul

1. He called _____.

Acts 9:6 (NIV)

“Now get up and go into the city, and you will be told what you must do.”

I Cor. 12:3 (NIV)

“Therefore I want you to know that no one who is speaking by the Spirit of God says, “Jesus be cursed,” and no one can say, “Jesus is Lord,” except by the Holy Spirit.”

2. Three days later he received the Baptism in the Holy Spirit.

Acts 9:9 & 17 (NIV)

“For three days he was blind, and did not eat or drink anything. Then Ananias went to the house and entered it. Placing his hands on Saul, he said, “Brother Saul, the Lord—Jesus, who appeared to you on the road as you were coming here—has sent me so that you may see again and be filled with the Holy Spirit.”

- e. The experience of the Ephesians:

1. They were disciples

Acts 19:1 (NIV)

“While Apollos was at Corinth, Paul took the road through the interior and arrived at Ephesus. There he found some disciples.”

2. Paul asked them, “Have you _____ ... since you _____

Acts 19:5 (NIV)

“On hearing this, they were baptized in the name of the Lord Jesus.”

4. Then Paul laid hands on them and they _____.

Acts 19:6 (NIV)

“When Paul placed his hands on them, the Holy Spirit came on them, and they spoke in tongues and prophesied.”

Note: The experience of the Ephesians took place twenty years after Acts 2:4.

5. Paul’s question to the Ephesians, “have you received... since you believed”, implies that the Baptism in the Holy Spirit is a distinct and separate work of the Holy Spirit.

Important notice: If the “Baptism” in the Spirit came at salvation, then why didn’t the apostles teach it as such. Instead, all evidence shows that they themselves taught that the Spirit’s baptism came after salvation.

MEMORY VERSE: ECCLESIASTES 4: 12

"Though one may be overpowered, two can defend themselves.
A cord of three strands is not quickly broken."

II. INTRODUCTION

God did not intend for us to journey through life all alone. In the same way He created natural families, God created spiritual families (the local church) to bless us with people to rejoice with when times are good, and people to support us when times are bad. Also, being in relationship with others helps us to be accountable and authentic in our faith. Who's going to support and encourage you Monday through Saturday if people only see you on Sunday morning? Most importantly, the Bible tells us the world will know we are disciples of Jesus by our love for one another (John 13:35).

III. HOW DO I GET CONNECTED?

1. Get Connected through Small Groups

Small Groups are one the best ways to get to know other people in the church. Small Groups meet regularly in people's homes to study the Bible, pray, and develop relationships. Relationship is the key to Small Groups. As the church gets larger, we need to get "smaller". It's easy to get lost in the crowd of a large church, but small groups allow people to get to know one another on a one-on-one basis.

The New Testament Church was made up of small groups. In Acts 2:42, 46, we read that "They devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and to the fellowship, to the breaking of bread and to prayer. Every day they continued to meet together in the temple courts. They broke bread in their homes and ate together with glad and sincere hearts ..." They realized that large group worship in the temple was important, but small group fellowship was just as vital.

2. Get Connected through Service

Serving in the church is another great way to get to know people who have similar interests as you. Not only will you get to know the people you are serving with, but the people you are ministering to will get to know you as well. Being active in the life of the church will put you in contact with many more people as opposed to simply coming and leaving service Sunday after Sunday; but beyond that, serving reminds us that we are called to serve one another. "Just as the Son of Man (Jesus) did not come to be served but to serve..." (Matt. 20:28) If Jesus came to Earth to serve, and we want to be his followers, shouldn't we do likewise? Serving in the church is a great way to get started!

3. Get Connected through Social Events

Several times a year at Bethlehem we host several events where people can get to know each other outside of the church building. Summer Block Parties, the Annual Missions' Banquet, Outreaches, are just a few of these events ...so be there!

IV. IN CONCLUSION...

The pastors are not physically capable (despite every good intention) of being deeply involved in every single church member's life. That's why it is so important to surround yourself with the right people who are going to encourage you, support you, keep you accountable, and help bring you closer to God. Especially if you are a new believer, it's so important to find support in other Christians. The Bible says that "bad company corrupts good character" (1 Cor. 15:33) so choose your friendships wisely. Don't allow anyone to draw you away from Christ. Our desire is to see you cultivate Godly, life-transforming friendships with others in church that will cause you to grow deeper in your faith.
